Erich Pranno

It is with sadness that I report the death on 9th March 2008 of Erich Pranno of Estonia. Erich was known to members of this Society through our visits to Estonia and his attendance at other events. In the clematis world, Erich Pranno is best known for his beautiful viorna cross, *C. 'Kaiu'*, though in fact he bred and selected many others.

I thank Erika Mahhov of Estonia for her tribute to Erich Pranno, published in abbreviated form below. Her complete tribute will be published in the forthcoming issue of our journal, *Clematis International 2008*.

Erich Pranno - 13 March 1930 - 9 March 2008

Erich Pranno amassed a collection of some 300 hybrids, one of the largest in the then USSR. He was a founding member of Estonian Clematis Club in 1987, the same year when he received a service medal award from the Estonian Horticultural Society. With Uno Kivistik, he was one of the leading promoters of clematis in Estonia. Together they arranged exhibitions in Estonia and other countries and visited internationally recognized Clematis specialists. As a member of the Estonian Clematis Club he participated in the meetings of the International Clematis Society, be it in Germany, Sweden, England, Japan or elsewhere.

Erich Pranno tried his hand also in breeding new Clematis. From seed of *C. 'Alionushka'*, he got differing seedlings but with integrifolia characteristics, being hardy and resistant to diseases as well as easy to take care of. They became quite popular and were known as "Pranno's hybrids".

Erich was world-famous for his viorna-group hybrid *C. 'Kaiu'*, with its small white urn-shaped nodding flowers, named after his home village. It came from seedlings he obtained from Ukrainian Nikitsky Botanic Garden. He grew these and made a selection in 1982. This hybrid was unknown internationally until some 10 years later when the Soviet "iron curtain" had fallen and the International Clematis Society visited Estonia in 1992. Apart for the beautiful blossom, the cultivar is highly appreciated for its vigorous and hardy growth, and strong health. In our garden, the plant flowers from July to October, almost until the first snows. With this extraordinary hybrid, Erich Pranno remains in the memories of all the Clematis-lovers of the world. As a person, Erich was a humorous, friendly and sparkling companion, with lot of knowledge and experience. He was a wonderful father and the best grandfather for his grandchild. His daughter, sister and brother and their families will mourn for him, as well as his relatives and friends and all Estonian Clematarians.

9. Future Meetings of the Society

2009 Switzerland

It is proposed that the Society will visit Switzerland in 2009. We thank Marianne Fistarol and her friends, who have worked hard to put together an interesting programme.

Switzerland does not, perhaps, have quite the clematis attraction of some other countries, but it has fabulous Alpine Flora and a large part of the programme is focused on this. However we hope to see *Clematis alpina* flowering in the Gastern Valley and/or the Alpine Garden, depending on climatic conditions.

Similarly whilst there are no specialist Clematis breeders, we will visit a nursery with some 400 different Clematis and an excellent Garden Centre, also with a wide range of Clematis.

The approximate cost is estimated to be around €1700 (dependant on exchange rates and the number of attendees). It includes accommodation, transport during the programme, admissions, guides and all meals other than one lunch and two dinners.

The itinerary is provisional and may be subject to some changes. Further details, together with a Request for Registration and payment of a deposit should be published towards the end of 2008.

2010 Portland, Oregon

At our meeting in Ireland in 2006, Friends of the Rogerson Clematis Collection (FRCC) President, Sally Geist, urged and supported by I.C.I.S. Council member Linda Beutler, invited the I.C.I.S. to return to Oregon, USA for our 2010 Conference and Constitutional General Meeting. It will then be 9 years since our previous (and first) visit to the USA, that one hosted by the Pacific Northwest Clematis Society (PNCS).

The focus of the event will be an extended visit to the new site of the Rogerson Clematis Collection at Luscher Farm in Lake Oswego, Oregon, USA (south of Portland), which will have been in development over four years by then. It is probable that this will be a late summer or early autumn event, as the Pacific Northwest enjoys an extended blooming season, and numerous clematis present their best efforts in August and September, even if they initially flowered earlier.

17. Ratification of nominations for the Golden Clematis Award

The purpose of this award is to recognize excellence in clematis matter by both members and non-members of this Society. Klaus Körber, previous President of this Society, accepted responsibility for drawing up the rules and running our Golden Clematis Awards programme.

At the Council Meeting in Sweden in 2007, Klaus Körber presented a number of nominations which he had received for consideration by Council. The accepted nominations will be presented to the Constitutional General Meeting in 2008.

18. Ratification of proposed changes to the Constitution

A number of changes have been proposed to the Constitution to make it more representative of the Society today. The changes are as a result of two concerns; firstly that our Aims were not representative of what the Society actually does today and secondly to make it clearer what a Member of the Society is entitled to.

The Society's Aims:

Linda Beutler, Publicity Officer, with help from Maurice Horn has proposed that the original statement of 'Aims' be replaced by a 'Mission' statement and 'Goals'. This gives a more modern and realistic view of the Society's aims and activities.

Membership:

With the new category of Nursery Membership a number of questions have been raised, demonstrating that our Constitution does not state clearly the Rights and Privileges to which members are entitled.

Originally a Member was one person who paid a Membership Fee, attended meetings, was entitled to one vote at the C.G.M. and received one copy of the Journal. However over the years the Society has allowed two people to be recorded within an entry on the Membership List, with both allowed to attend meetings at the Member rate but only receiving one copy of the Journal between them.

It has always been my understanding that at a C.G.M. these two people, such as myself (Fiona Woolfenden) and Ken, would only have a single vote, though for a number of years I have wondered whether this is appreciated by everyone else. However to date we have never had a vote contested at any Constitutional General Meeting so the issue has never arisen.

With the inclusion of the new category of membership, Nursery Membership, it is time to clarify things. The changes propose the concept of a 'Membership', with one or two 'Members'. One can then define the Rights and Privileges of Membership and, separately, the Rights and Privileges of Members.

I hope that you will support the proposed changes to the Constitution.

19. Ratification of the proposed changes to the Clematis for Beginners List

The Clematis for Beginners List was published by the Society in January 2004, after more than two years of consultation and consideration. Last year the Council decided it was time to review the List, in order to determine if all entries still justified their inclusion.

For clematis to be in the List not only must they be good clematis, they should also be widely available across the world. Thus an exceptionally good clematis that is available across Europe but not in North America nor in Japan, for example, should not be included. Clematis for inclusion should also be available for nurseries to propagate and provide to the public without restrictions.

In the September 2007 Newsletter the Council itemised some proposed changes to the list, along with a revised copy of the Clematis for Beginners List showing additions, amendments and deletions.

I would like to thank everyone who commented on these proposed changes. All comments have been carefully considered and the majority have been incorporated into the latest version of the List, Draft 2.3.

If you compare the version enclosed with this Newsletter (Draft 2.3) with the version sent out with the September 2007 Newsletter (Draft 2.1) you will see that most of the changes in this new version are to do with how cultivars on the List are grouped.

Some of the changes that we had planned to make contradicted the groupings in *The International Clematis Register and Checklist 2002*. I would like to thank Wim Snoeijer for pointing this out and also Duncan Donald, the International Clematis Registrar, for his time spent checking the List and proposing changes.

Specific clematis which have been added or removed from the List since Draft 2.1 are itemised below along with the reasons why:

1. Montana Group – ‘Elizabeth’ – it has been pointed out that the true ‘Elizabeth’ is not generally available so it should not be added to the List.
2. Montana Group – ‘Tetrarose’ – the true plant is also not generally available so it should be removed from the List.
3. Viticella Group – ‘Royal Velours’ suffers from mildew so it should be removed.
4. Viticella Group – ‘Walenburg’ has been added to the List as it is available from at least one source in the USA.
5. Integrifolia/Diversifolia Group - × *diversifolia* ‘Blue Boy’ suffers from mildew and is very similar but less compact than ‘Hendersonii’ so it has been removed.
6. *C. terniflora* is probably not a good plant to recommend as it has escaped into the wild in a number of countries so has been removed from the list.

Although your particular favourite may not be on the List, I quote Klaus Körber’s words “A List is better than no List”.

Proxy Voting

I would like to thank those members for the time and effort they have spent on the Golden Clematis Award, the Constitution changes and the Clematis for Beginners List. We have listened to all comments that we have received and have tried wherever possible to take them into account, so I hope all members will feel they can fully support the Society and vote for the proposed motions.

If you will not be attending the Constitutional General Meeting in Nagoya, you can vote by proxy by completing and returning the Proxy Voting Form (printed on page 15 of this newsletter) to the Secretary, to be received no later than 24th May 2008.

Nurseries

Because of the great success of the past Clematis Festivals in 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2007 we will organize the third Festival on August 9th, 2008. Three nurseries, one from Holland, one from Germany and one from Belgium, will sell clematis plants in an unusual range of choices for Holland. All three nurseries together might have about 300 different cultivars and species for sale; even new introductions from 2006 and 2007 will be present.

From the “De Boschhoeve” nursery there will be a large selection of perennials for sale including a wide selection of brown-leaved Dahlias.

The stands

In the stands in the farm shed you will find a range of activities:

- A local florist will show how to use Clematis in flower arrangements.
- The British Clematis Society will be present with their famous sales table selling e.g. mugs, cards, clematis seeds and books.
- On the information stand Ton Hannink will be present.

Entrance fee

€3.50, children up to 12 years no admission. This fee is for the Clematis Festival, the garden, the lectures and the demonstrations.

Direction by car

Take exit no 25 Wolfheze on the motorway A12. At the end of the exit follow the direction to Wolfheze. At the first crossing with traffic lights, turn right following the direction to Wolfheze (80 km road). Follow this road into Wolfheze village (50 km road), pass the railway and turn directly right on to the Parallelweg (still 50 km road). Follow this road along the railway and pass the board leaving Wolfheze village. After ± 200 m there is a sign to the left for the Clematis Festival entrance. Parking is free, in a field.

Public transport

Take the stop train from Ede-Wageningen or Arnhem. This service is only once per hour. From Wolfheze station walk opposite the station building on to the Parallelweg. There is a bicycle path on which you can walk. Follow the path, passing the board Wolfheze village and walk another 200 m, turn left on to sand path. The walk will take about 30 minutes.

Light refreshments

In the main shed there is a coffee & tea service, as well as cakes, soup and sandwiches. In this main shed several gardening tools are for sale and some seeds.

The garden

The garden is a typical Dutch garden with large lawns, perennial borders and garden rooms. All summer and early autumn perennials are expected to be in flower. The famous vegetable garden shows a wide range of vegetables and herbs combined with annuals and summer flowering bulbs. Clematis can be found around both plots and the summer flowering clematis are expected to be in flower.

Etc.

Photography is allowed in the garden but only for private use. Commercial photography is only allowed after consent. Dogs are allowed but only on lead. The site has reasonable accessible by wheelchair. The currency at the Clematis Festival is Euro.

Seed Exchange – Seed List 2008

Many thanks once again to Marita Opalka for all her work, cleaning, sorting, processing and packing all the seed that you have sent to her so that she can produce the 2008 Seed List. Our thanks as well to those members who collect seed and contribute it to the Seed Exchange.

We are also pleased that we can send seeds to our USA members. The process is slightly contorted in that all seed must go via a recognised and registered importer. Richard Huff has volunteered to take on this task. and we have successfully sent seed.

Members in the USA should fill in their requests and send them to Marita Opalka, the same as everybody else. Marita will wait for a few weeks so that she can package all seeds for the USA in a single parcel. This is sent to US Customs for inspection who, assuming the seeds are OK, send them on to Richard Huff. Richard will have a list of who requested what and he will then forward the individual seed packets to the requesting members.

Obviously this process will delay receipt of seeds by a few weeks, so please be patient. We have successfully used this method in the past and do not anticipate any problems.

Once again the Society has decided there will be **NO** charge for seeds.
